









**Cut back on your Acers/ Maples early in the fall to achieve the best and brightest fall colors.**

<p><i>Acer x freemanii</i> 'Jeffensred' <b>'Autumn Blaze' Maple</b></p>	<p>Excellent orange-red fall color that persists longer than many cultivars. Rapid, upright growth habit. Tolerates a wide range of soil conditions but prefers a protected, dry spot.</p>	<p>H 35-40' W 30' Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Acer x freemanii</i> 'Sienna' <b>Sienna Glen® Maple</b></p>	<p>Upright, vigorous, pyramidal growth habit. Fall colors are orange red to burgundy and finalizing to a burnt orange. Color changes earlier than similar varieties. Branching is compact, tree weathers high winds exceptionally well. Plant in full sun. Tolerant of higher pH soils than similar varieties.</p>	<p>H 40-50' W 30' Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Acer negundo</i> <b>Sensation Maple</b></p>	<p>Sensation is a male box elder clone that features slower, more controlled growth, improved branch structure, and an outstanding display of brilliant red autumn foliage.</p>	<p>H 30' W 25' Zone 4</p>	<p>Photo Credit: JF Schmidt</p> 
<p><i>Acer platanoides</i> <b>'Helena' Maple</b></p>	<p>A Norway maple found in Helena and noted for hardiness. Selected for outstanding habits and vigor. Fast growing. Oval shape. Handsome gold fall color. It needs good drainage. Wrap the trunk in winter especially when the tree is young.</p>	<p>H 45-55' W 25-35' Zone 4</p>	





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<p><i>Acer tataricum</i>  <b>'Hot Wings'</b>                      Tatarian maple available in shrub form too</p>	<p>Small tree with clusters of yellow-white flowers in spring. The "wings" turn bright red for several weeks in summer followed by beautiful orange-red fall color. A good tree for dry, alkaline soil. Xeriscape plant.</p>	<p>H 18-20'                      W 15-18'                      Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Aesculus x arnoldiana</i>  <b>'Autumn Splendor'</b>                      Buckeye</p>	<p>Smaller, dense, rounded buckeye with unusual bright red fall foliage. Large spikes of creamy yellow-red bloom in late spring. Scorch resistant. Tolerant of drought once established. Prefers moist, well-drained soil.</p>	<p>H 25'-30'                      W 20'-25'                      Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Betula papyrifera</i>  <b>Paper Birch</b></p>	<p>In cooler climates, this is the most permanent and desirable of all white barked Birches. Slow to turn white, but perfect chalk-white when older. <p><i>Betula papyrifera</i>  <b>Renaissance Oasis Paper Birch</b></p>	<p>The most drought-tolerant birch in the Renaissance Series. The juvenile bark is an outstanding red bronze, turning white with attractive exfoliation. Dense, broad pyramidal form. Dark green leaves turn yellow in fall. 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<p><i>Betula papyrifera</i> 'Varen' <b>Prairie Dream® Paper Birch</b></p>	<p>Exceptional snow-white exfoliating bark, with quality, dark green foliage, and excellent golden-yellow autumn foliage. Superior adaptation and stress tolerance. Resistant to bronze birch borer. Excellent grown single or multi-trunked. Adds great winter interest.</p>	<p>H 40'-50' W 30'-40' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Betula pendula</i> 'Dalecarlica' <b>Cut leaf Weeping Birch</b></p>	<p>A large, graceful tree with long weeping branches and delicate leaves. Noted for its beautiful white bark at an early age. An extremely hardy tree. Requires deep watering.</p>	<p>H 30'-40' W 20' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Betula platyphylla</i> 'Fargo' <b>Dakota Pinnacle White Birch</b></p>	<p>Developed at North Dakota State University, this tree was selected for its narrow, columnar habit. Tolerant of heat and alkaline soils.</p>	<p>H 20-25' W 8-10' Zone 3</p>	<p>Photo Credit: JF Schmidt</p> 

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<p><i>Betula platyphylla</i>  <b>Parkland Pillar™ – First Editions® Birch</b></p>	<p>A fast growing very cold hardy tree well suited to the prairie &amp; urban landscape. Tolerant of heat, drought, and alkaline soils. Forms a narrow column of dense dark green foliage that turns golden yellow in the fall, revealing its white bark during the winter months. <p><i>Betula populifolia</i> x <i>B. Hybrid.</i>  <b>Clumping Birch</b></p>	<p>A hybrid of ‘Crimson Frost’ and ‘Whitespire’, this tree combines purple-bronze foliage with an upright pyramidal growth habit. It maintains a strong leader and shows better caliper development and density than other purple leaf birch.</p>	<p>H 40’                      W 25’                      Zone 4</p>	<p>Photo Credit: JF Schmidt</p> 
<p><i>Betula populifolia</i> ‘Whitespire’  <b>Birch (Clump Form)</b></p>	<p>Non-exfoliating chalk-white bark. Green foliage turns yellow in the fall. Plant in full sun to partial shade. Adapts to most soil conditions. Does best in moist, well-drained soil. Resistant to bronze birch borer.</p>	<p>H 30-40’                      W 15-25’                      Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Celtis occidentalis</i>  <b>Hackberry</b></p>	<p>This moderate to rapid grower thrives in the toughest climates. It has great adaptability to heat, drought, and cold. Wet or poor soils.</p>	<p>H 35-40’                      W 20-25’                      Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Crataegus crus-galli</i></p>	<p>A beautiful small tree with all-</p>	<p>H 15-20’</p>	







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<p><i>var.inermis</i> <b>Thornless Cockspur Hawthorn</b></p>	<p>season interest. Deep green glossy leathery leaves. Pretty white flowers in spring, followed by abundant red holly-like berries persist through Christmas. Orange fall color, silvery bark, and striking silhouette in winter.</p>	<p>W 15-20' Zone 4</p>	
<p><i>Crataegus crus-galli inermis</i> <b>'Crusader' or 'Cruzam'</b> <b>Thornless Cockspur Hawthorn</b></p>	<p>Abundant white floral display in late spring, attractive silver bark, colorful fall foliage, and showy fruit. It shrugs off wet and dry soils, is not fussy about pH levels, is unbothered by clay or salt, and resists the many diseases that often plague the rose family. Showy fruit that supports wildlife. <p><i>Gleditsia triacanthos var. inermis</i> <b>'Northern Acclaim' Honey Locust</b></p>	<p>Upright and pyramidal habit. Great winter hardiness. Attractive, bright green foliage turns golden yellow in the fall. Seedless.</p>	<p>H 30-40' W 20-30' Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Gymnocladus</i> <b>'Espresso' Kentucky Coffee Tree</b></p>	<p>Large, frond-like, doubly compound leaves form a canopy of dappled shade that gives this city-tough tree an airy, tropical feel. The arching branches of this seedless selection present an elm-like shape as the tree matures. 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

<p><i>Gymnocladus</i> <b>'True North' Kentucky Coffee Tree</b></p>	<p>Upright vase-shape that resembles the classic Elm form. The dark green bi-pinnately compound leaves turn yellow in the fall and provide dappled shade. Attractive dark scaly bark in the winter. Adaptable to a range of soil types including alkaline. Tolerant of urban conditions including cold, heat, and drought.</p>	<p>H 50-70' W 25-35' Zone 4</p>	<p>Photo Credit: Bailey Nursery</p> 
<p><i>Juglans nigra</i> <b>Black Walnut</b></p>	<p>Attractive, large, hardy, oval. A heritage tree. Grows rapidly when young but slows down with age. It has edible nuts, and the leaves are green throughout the season.</p>	<p>H 40-50' W 25-30' Zone 3</p>	<p>Photo Credit Baileys Nursery</p> 
<p><i>Malus</i> <b>Courageous Crab</b></p>	<p>Year-round interest and disease resistance. In spring, the tree is covered in pink buds that transform into fragrant lilac-pink flowers. The new leaves exhibit a maroon appearance before changing to green bronze in summer. Fall brings yellow-orange foliage, adding another layer of interest to this upright tree. <p><i>Malus</i> <b>Gladiator Crab</b></p>	<p>An excellent ornamental tree with a profusion of bright pink flowers followed by small reddish-purple fruit on a stately, upright crown. <p><i>Malus x adstringens</i> <b>Green Walspire Crab</b></p>	<p>Columnar tree that forms a beautiful multi-seasonal structural element as a specimen or a tall privacy hedge when planted in mass. In spring, pink buds transform into white flowers, later becoming red fruit that accents the green foliage in late summer before turning bronze in fall.</p>	<p>H 18-20' W 5-6' Zone 2</p>	<p>Photo Credit Baileys Nursery</p> 
<p><i>Malus</i> 'Klehem's Bechtel' <b>Flowering Crab</b></p>	<p>Fragrant, large, pink double blossoms with soft green foliage. Blooms later than most flowering crabs. Vase-shaped form with little to no fruit.</p>	<p>H 20-25' W 15-20' Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Malus</i> 'Louisa' Pink <b>Weeping Flowering Crab</b></p>	<p>A weeping, pink-blossoming, crabapple tree. Branches cascade towards the ground. Red buds open in midspring to fragrance and soft-pink flowers. Glossy, yellow fruit. Leaves turn orange yellow in the fall. Good disease resistance.</p>	<p>H 12-15' W 10-12' Zone 4</p>	
<p><i>Malus</i> 'Prairiefire' <b>Flowering Crab</b></p>	<p>A beautiful, small, disease-resistant tree with multi-seasonal interest. Buds open to purplish-red blossoms in spring. Dark red-purple persistent pea-sized fruits adorn the tree into winter providing winter bird food.</p>	<p>H 15-20' W 20' Zone 4</p>	




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<p><i>Malus 'Radiant'</i> <b>Flowering Crab</b></p>	<p>Compact flowering crab is hardy with single, deep pink flowers followed by bright red fruit. The foliage is red-purple when young, aging to green. Full sun.</p>	<p>H 15-20' W 20' Zone 3</p>	<p>Photo Credit Baileys Nursery</p> 
<p><i>Malus 'Ruby Tears'</i> <b>Flowering Crab</b></p>	<p>Red buds open to fragrant pink flowers which completely engulf the cascading branches each spring. This naturally weeping crab has a habit like 'Louisa' and burgundy-green foliage like 'Prairifire'. Attractive dark red fruit lasts until mid-winter.</p>	<p>H 8-10' W 12-15' Zone 4</p>	<p>Photo Credit Baileys Nursery</p> 
<p><i>Malus 'Spring Snow'</i> <b>Flowering Crab</b></p>	<p>Fragrant pink buds open to showy white blossoms. Fruitless variety, no mess of falling apples. Bright green foliage and tolerant of heat. Gold in the fall.</p>	<p>H 18-20' W 15-20' Zone 4</p>	
<p><i>Malus 'Thunderchild'</i> <b>Flowering Crab</b></p>	<p>This hardy, compact, upright crabapple tree has deep purple leaves with delicate pink flowers. Resistant to fire blight. Dark red-purple non-falling pea-sized fruits adorn the tree into winter.</p>	<p>H 15-20' W 15' Zone 3</p>	






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<p><i>Malus</i> 'Tina' <b>Weeping Crab</b></p>	<p>This dwarf Sargent-type crab has pink to red buds that open to white flowers, followed by tiny red crabapples. It is disease resistant and is a highly ornamental small tree for limited spaces.</p>	<p>H 6-8' W 8-10' Zone 4</p>	<p>Photo Credit Baileys Nursery</p> 
<p><i>Populus</i> 'Highland' <b>Poplar</b></p>	<p>A fast growing, deciduous shade tree with a dense, pyramidal crown. Yellow fall color. Full sun. Cottonless and disease resistant.</p>	<p>H 40' W 15-20' Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Populus tremula</i> 'Erecta' <b>Swedish Aspen</b></p>	<p>A great tree for someone with limited space or needing some privacy. Tall, seedless, columnar shape with orange -apricot fall color.</p>	<p>H 30-35' W 5-8' Zone 2</p>	

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<p><i>Populus tremuloides</i> <b>Summer Shimmer Aspen</b></p>	<p>Shimmering large, dark glossy green leaves that turn shades of yellow each fall. Summer Shimmer® suckers dramatically less than other quaking aspen, making it a better choice for smaller landscapes as a specimen or in groves.</p>	<p>H 30-35' W 15-20' Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Populus Tremula</i> <b>Columnar Swedish Aspen</b></p>	<p>Slender tree is great for smaller spaces, screens and along drives. More resistant to canker than other columnar poplars. Dark green leaves have a lighter silvery-green underside providing both visual interest and soothing sound in a breeze. <p><i>Populus tremuloides</i> <b>Quaking Aspen</b></p>	<p>Small leaves tremble in the slightest breeze. Large and fast-growing tree. Indifferent to soil conditions, easy to grow.</p>	<p>H 30-35' W 15-20' Zone 2</p>

<i>Prunus Maackii</i> <b>Amur Bird Cherry/ Chokecherry</b>	This small tree produces white flowers and black fruit. The outstanding exfoliating bark is golden brown to dark red with a glistening metallic gold color for excellent winter effect and landscape interest. Good wildlife plant. <i>Prunus virginiana</i> <b>'Canada Red Cherry Select'</b>	Improved selection, vigorous growth, straight trunk, uniform top. White spring flowers, few fruit. Deep Maroon foliage. Prefers well-drained soil.	H 20-25' W 20' Zone 2	
<i>Quercus macrocarpa</i> <b>Bur Oak</b>	<i>Our national tree.</i> Lustrous, dark green foliage in summer, yellowish fall color. Attractive, corky bark is especially interesting in winter.	H 50-70' W 30-40' Zone 3	


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<p><i>Quercus macrocarpa</i> <b>'Kindred Spirit' Columnar Oak</b></p>	<p>Fast growing oak with glossy leaves that turn a stunning red orange in the fall. This outstanding columnar oak gets its slim figure from crossing an Upright English Oak with a Swamp White Oak. It's tight, upright habit makes it perfect for small, urban spaces. <p><i>Salix alba</i> 'Vitellina' <b>Golden Willow</b></p>	<p>Bright, golden yellow bark, especially noticeable in winter. Glossy green leaves and broad, pyramidal shape. Best used as a screen and in large landscapes. Hardy and fast growing.</p>	<p>H 50' W 25-30' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Salix</i> 'Prairie Cascade' <b>Prairie Cascade Willow</b></p>	<p>Selected by the Morden Research station in Manitoba for cold hardiness. It combines a weeping habit, golden stems, and dark green glossy foliage</p>	<p>H 30' W 40' Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Salix pentandra</i> 'Silver Lake' <b>Prairie Reflection Laurel Willow</b></p>	<p>Grows rapidly, producing a dense rounded tree with very dark green, highly glossy foliage. Does not tend to suffer from chlorosis due to iron deficiency. Will require pruning to produce a single stemmed tree.</p>	<p>H 35-40' W 25' Zone 2</p>	<p>Photo Credit Tagawa Gardens</p> 



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<p><i>Sorbus aucuparia</i> 'Fastigiata'  <b>Columnar Mountain Ash</b></p>	<p>Upright, pyramidal, slow-growing deciduous tree. Compact, dark green foliage with yellow and red fall color. Small orange-red berry clusters in fall attract birds.</p>	<p>H 10-20'                      W 5-10'                      Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Sorbus hybrida</i>  <b>Oak Leaf Mountain Ash</b></p>	<p>Lobed Oak-like leaves. White spring flowers and beautiful orange-red fruit in early fall. Orange-brown fall color accents the berries.</p>	<p>H 25-30'                      W 20'                      Zone 4</p>	
<p><i>Syringa reticulata</i>  <b>Ivory Silk®</b>  <b>Japanese Tree Lilac</b>                      Available in Single and Clump</p>	<p>Blooms in early summer. <p><i>Syringa reticulata</i>  <b>Japanese Tree Lilac Clump</b></p>	<p>Spectacular ornamental trees with large, fluffy, fragrant, ivory-colored flowers blooming in June. Quite easy to grow, disease resistant and drought tolerant.</p>	<p>H 20-25'                      W 15-20'                      Zone 3</p>	

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<p><i>Tilia mongolica</i> <b>'Greenspire' Linden</b></p>	<p>The standard for lindens. Characterized by its perfect, regular, upright oval crown. <p><i>Ulmus americana</i> <b>Princeton American Elm</b></p>	<p>Princeton is the classic American Elm reborn. Grows in a vase-shaped, arching form. One of the most resistant American Elm to Dutch Elm Disease.</p>	<p>H: 50-60' W:35-40' Zone 3</p>
